In 2023, for the first time, eighty families graduated from our Family Care program. They are now standing independent and strong on their own. A similar number of additional families graduated early in 2024.

The Family Care program has evolved into a fully mature model, creating lasting change in the lives of families we serve. Just a few years ago our approach was merely an idea, and then it became an experiment. Today, it stands on its own having proven its worth and viability far beyond our expectations.

On the following pages you will read more about the milestones we reached in 2023 and the transformative changes catalyzed through Family Care. I am truly grateful to all our stakeholders for your support and trust, which has allowed these achievements to be realized.

Our work is very far from complete. Looking forward, we are ready for many new families to enter the Family Care fold.

### **About Us**

We exist to support our partner in western Kenya, *United Kenya Rising* (UKR), in pursuit of our shared mission to assist families as they rise out of poverty.

Our work goes back 22 years. We are made up of volunteers and donors who were previously the driving forces behind Crossroads Springs Africa and Friends of Kakamega. In 2021 we officially consolidated to become Friends of Kenya Rising in support of our Kenyan partner's Family Care program.

We are unique because of our focus on whole families. Our sector is not education, livelihoods, agriculture, public health, or health (although our work covers all of these). Our sector is "the family."

We are proud to take a deep-impact approach, and would rather assist a smaller number of people transformationally, than a larger number lightly.

We assist Kenyan students and their families as they rise out of poverty.

A world without poverty where all people are equipped to build the kinds of lives they want and value.

## **Our Partnership**


Our sole partner is United Kenya Rising (UKR), based in Kakamega, Kenya. The organization's leadership and board come from the western Kenya communities where UKR makes its impact.

We as Friends of Kenya Rising are an American 501(c)(3) charity that supports United Kenya Rising and its Family Care program. We are led by a volunteer Board of Directors who have spent time in Kakamega and care deeply about UKR's work. We watch what goes on closely, and we are very proud of what our supporters have helped UKR build.

Throughout this 2023 Annual Report, "we" will speak with one voice.

Instead of repeating phrases like "our Kenyan partner UKR's social work team," this report simply says "our social work team." Doing this makes reading much easier, but we do not want it to suggest that "we" the Americans at Friends of Kenya Rising operate Family Care. Our Kenyan partners do that. We are here to support them and grow the incredible impact UKR creates with the donor funds we steward.





## **The Family Care Model**

Family Care works through five pillars or "Guidings Stars," all of them interconnected:

- Fducation
- Livelihoods
- Agriculture
- Dignified Homes
- Health

The Family Care program collaborates with families to help them overcome their challenges and leverage their unique strengths.


Social workers and agriculture officers work closely with each family for three years, visiting frequently and knowing them well. The education team mentors students, and public health staff guide home improvements.

A flexible budget is available for use - as needed most - to assist in each unique family's situation. Financial help is usually co-financed by the family itself, and is oriented toward accomplishing specific goals.

We also offer scholarships for bright students, building materials for homestead renovations, tree seedlings for the future, and critical home goods like water filters for the present.

## Highlights of 2023...

- UKR launches its **website** (<u>www.unitedkenyarising.org</u>)
- Need-based distributions of mosquito nets and water filters
- Innovative new **brick machine** introduced for better structures, climate, & income
- Free community **eye clinics** reach over 1,500 people in the villages we serve
- **Visits, partnerships, and friendships** with like-minded organizations including WEWASAFO, Grace Initiative, Transforming Nations, Kesho Kenya, Friendly Water for the World, Segal Family Foundation, and Weza Care
- A **mini-documentary** on our Family Care model, <u>Nyota Zetu</u> ("Our Stars") is released on YouTube
- Our first cohort of **80 families graduated** at the end of the year! Another 77 families were being prepared for graduation in the first half of 2024
- An amazing new Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) system was implemented, and provides numbers for this report. We don't have all "before" data for graduating families, so their outcomes are sometimes compared to the situations of our newest families in this report.



# The **EDUCATION Guiding Star**

Family Care ensures all children can access K-12 education, and opens opportunities for youth to reach new heights

Where we work, people believe that education is key to success, and cost is usually the greatest barrier to children's learning. To address this, we help families pay for schooling and guide students on getting the most out of their education.

Our social work and education teams engage with students through home visits and one-on-one counselling. They also visit students at schools, and offer life-skills workshops in areas like self-motivation, character development, and sexual & reproductive health.

We believe in walking together, instead of taking over. And we've learned that families' financial involvement also leads to higher levels of parental engagement in students' academics. Over the course of their three-years in Family Care, families take on an increasing share of education expenses and are asked to chip in toward any scholarship students' studies.

## **HOW IT WORKS**

#### **All Family Care students & youth**

Partial help for basic education is available from each family's flexible-use budget.

Over time, through success in farming and business, families take on these reasonable costs.

## Ann's success story

"It was while studying at high school that I discovered my happy place to be, the computer laboratory," shared Ann Nyawino, a third year student at KCA University. Ann is pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Applied Computing under one of our scholarships.

As a girl, Ann loved to help repair broken radios and other discarded gadgets, nurturing her interest in technology. When she grew older and understood the weight of her older brother's cerebral palsy condition, her interest in technology escalated. Most of Ann's family's finances were being spent on her brother's treatment, and it seemed


to her like every new doctor started from scratch. There was no coordination, and this sparked her dream to help the situation.

Ann's mission became development of medical database systems for the health sector, so that the sector can better treat her brother and others like him. "I feel like if we impact more technology in neuro treatment, a permanent cure [for cerebral palsy] can be achieved."











# The *LIVELIHOODS*Guiding Star

Family Care helps families develop multiple sources of income from business and farming, building momentum toward financial independence

A meaningful and sustainable income is the cornerstone of success for families struggling to rise above poverty.

The Family Care program focuses on guiding families to develop multiple sources of livelihood. This grows their resilience to withstand unforeseen challenges. Staff use an approach inspired by *Street Business School* to train about market opportunities and business planning & operation.

For parents in Family Care, a successful livelihoods combination usually includes agriculture projects and other non-farm business ventures.

Meanwhile, for the next generation, our university and vocational education scholarships under the *Education* Guiding Star equip youth with skills for employment or self-employment.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

#### **Business Training**

The social work team implements a microentrepreneurship training curriculum. This trains families on simple and clear methods to conduct market research, plan and manage a business, and invest for growth. Meanwhile, the agriculture team organizes field trips for seeing and learning about successful farm business ventures.

#### **Capital**

Families "start small" on their own to prove a business concept. Then, ventures showing commitment and promise benefit from capital boosts through flexible Family Care budgets. We also introduce budding businesspeople to microfinance banks.

#### Savings and investment

UKR families are encouraged to save for both investment and emergencies. They also engage in financial empowerment through their own village-based savings groups.

## The Musindayis' success story


A few years ago, Lilian struggled to grow food for her children and had no source of income apart from casual labor on other people's farms. Today, she runs an eatery serving local dishes, and she also earns from her farm's bounty.

Lilian's oldest child, Kays, studied to be a professional cook through our vocational scholarship program. He often gets gig work, but doesn't yet have a full-time job. You will often find him helping his mom at the family eatery, keenly focused on producing the tastiest food possible.

The eatery is a result of Lilian's two years of work "starting small" on her own selling roasted maize. Over two years, her savings grew and UKR matched what she had so she could realize her dream of launching the eatery. Part of what she now serves is grown on her own farm.

Apart from the eatery, Lilian raises and sells eggs, chickens, sweet potatoes, spring onions, and six types of leafy greens. She also earns from macadamia nut tees, and she's invested in the future with a growing herd of goats and a maturing orchard of avocado, papaya, and citrus.













# The AGRICULTURE Guiding Star

Family Care helps farmers sustainably increase their farms' diversity and productivity, improving both nutrition and incomes

Despite being blessed with one of the rainiest climates on earth, farmers in western Kenya face great challenges. These include tiny farm plots, depleted soils, and a rapidly changing climate.

For families who grow most of the food that they eat, agriculture training through Family Care is an invaluable resource helping put more food on the table. Farming also offers tremendous opportunities for income generation.

UKR provides farmers with essential knowledge, inputs, and tools to make their farms resilient and productive. The result is higher incomes and sufficient, nutritious meals.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

#### **Training and exposure**

The *Agriculture* Guiding Star of our Family Care program promotes new techniques and new crops, all with a focus on diversification and climate adaptation.

Farmers learn through extension visits on their farms, small-group trainings, larger workshops, and exposure field trips. They engage in-person with UKR's agriculture officers about twice per month.


#### Seedlings, animals, inputs, and tools

Often, training cannot be well implemented without other assistance. The program's flexible-use family budgets assist a lot in terms of agriculture.

Families receive fruit tree seedlings and seed packets or cuttings of novel crops. The program may help with buying fertilizer as families also produce compost and manure for the long-run. Costly items like animals or wheelbarrows may be provided based on families' unique situations and goals.

82% of families make their own compost after 3 years of Family Care, versus only 32% of new families joining





## The Barasas' success story

Benson and Laura joined our Family Care program in 2021, and since then they've overcome many challenges and transformed their family's situation. They now earn from horticulture, fish farming, a fruit orchard, and livestock.

Their eldest child, a son, will graduate at the end of 2024 from a renowned public high school. He continues with his last year of study under a UKR scholarship.

The family can now fully support their four younger children's education, and all five of their children's basic needs.

With a thriving farm that provides good food and a solid income, the Barasas are a fantastic example of how Family Care changes futures.











# The *DIGNIFIED HOMES*Guiding Star

Family Care helps ensure families have basic needs like light and power, and collaborates with them to build safe, decent homesteads

For families struggling to rise above poverty, a healthy home environment is a crucial step toward happiness and dignity in the community.

Our goal is for every family to live in a respectable home that is secure, leak-free during rain, with access to a hygienic pit latrine, and free of dangerous smoke from cooking fires.

We also seek to ensure all families have electric light, a comfortable place to sleep, nets to protect from malaria, water storage for home use, and safely treated water for drinking.

Safety and comfort at home are essential for mental health and facilitate people's ability to focus on bigger dreams like education or business. Good home conditions also positively impact all family members by helping prevent illnesses.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

#### **Collaborative homestead renovations**

The most urgent home situations are addressed first. With these major projects, we ask families to contribute significantly.

Typically, each family offers around ½ of construction costs in the form of sweat equity and locally available materials. We usually provide cost-prohibitive building materials like rebar, iron roofing sheets, and cement.





#### **Essential goods for daily life**

We offer some basic items like blankets, solar lights, and rainwater storage tanks as gifts, where needed.

94% of 2023's graduating families have electric or solar light and at least 500 liters of rainwater storage





## The Adalas' success story

When they joined our Family Care program in 2021, Grace's family lived in a cramped house of two tiny rooms. She shared this small space with her expectant daughter and her grown-up son. Grace felt ashamed of her homestead.

After developing a plan with the UKR team, she began saving towards a better house. Grace saved from her egg sales and earmarked an entire sugarcane harvest toward her goal, and it was enough money for her to afford most of the construction. Our program helped pay local laborers and provided the iron roof sheets that were still needed.


Grace's eldest son Clevens was studying public health under one of our scholarships. During school holidays and weekends, he contributed significantly with the heavy work needed to help mom get the construction accomplished.

Today, the family lives in a beautiful and relatively spacious semi-permanent home that will last Grace though old age. They also built a new pit latrine, replacing a hazardous old one. The family was blessed soon after with a baby girl, Grace's granddaughter. They all now sleep in an adequate space, on beds and mattresses, with blankets, under a leak-free roof.













# The **HEALTH**Guiding Star

Family Care helps families to prevent illness, access medical care, and treat conditions in order to lead a healthy routine

Good health is a foundational element of life quality. In sickness, little else matters, but in good health it is possible to find the energy, mindset, and hope to work hard for a brighter future.

Our *Health* Guiding Star trains families on basic health principles, and guides families on government-backed health insurance. In some cases, we will directly fund life-improving or life-saving medical procedures and medicines.

Families affected by conditions like HIV and Sickle Cell Disease get special attention from our agricultural officers and social workers to ensure good nutrition. Affected families are also linked with support organizations focused on their unique challenges.

In the larger community, we run eye clinics through a partnership with the Masinde Muliro University Optometry Department.

#### **HOW IT WORKS**

#### Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)

In concert with programming under our *Dignified Homes* Guiding Star, families have clean drinking water, sufficient mosquito nets, and hygienic latrines.

#### **Training and counselling**

Workshops and individual counselling for a healthy lifestyle, on topics like nutrition, domestic violence, vaccinations, family planning, and more.

#### **Community eye clinics and glasses**


Free clinics in the communities where we work help Family Care clients and thousands of others access vision care.



## Margaret's success story

A road accident as a bus passenger left Margaret, a mother of four, unable to walk. Shortly after, her husband passed on. It was then that her family was enrolled in UKR's Family Care program.

While in our program, Margaret received encouragement and financial help to undergo several surgeries and

physical therapy. She regained the ability to walk again, albeit with challenges.

Margaret can now do some lighter tasks on her farm, like feeding her chickens and collecting indigenous vegetable seeds for sale. Friends and family help with heavier work. She can also attend social gatherings, including her children's school meetings and church. Her prior immobility denied her this.

She always has her children and their education in mind, and this is where Margaret offers the most glowing feedback about Family Care. "UKR helped me to find ground once again, especially with the education of my children after my husband's demise. Two of my children graduated from universities as teachers, and one is almost completing high school. I'm forever indebted."








